WISE Pedagogy

- [n] the activities of educating or instructing or teaching; activities that impart knowledge or skill. -- WordNet



Pedagogy/Andragogy

Pedagogy, from Wikipedia:

Pedagogy is the art or science of teaching. The word comes from the ancient Greek *paidagogos*, the slave who took children to and from school. The word “paida” refers to children, which is why some like to make the distinction between pedagogy (teaching children) and [andragogy](#) (teaching adults). The Latin word for pedagogy, [education](#), is much more widely used, and often the two are used interchangeably.



Adult Learners

- Knowles' theory of andragogy is an attempt to develop a theory specifically for adult learning.
- Knowles emphasizes that adults are self-directed and expect to take responsibility for decisions. –

- 1. Adults need to know why they need to learn something
- 2. Adults need to learn experientially
- 3. Adults approach learning as problem-solving
- 4. Adults learn best when the topic is of immediate value

Premises

- Quality online education is as good or better than face-to-face.
- Online learning provides access to education for many non-traditional learners.
- The use of educational technology is increasing.
- There are many flavors of online education.
- Online education promotes interaction (F-S, S-S).



LEEP Retreat: Focus on intergroup dialogue

- What are effective practices?
 - Orientation, also known as “boot camp”
 - On-campus sessions (2-3 day/semester residencies)
 - Group work
 - Synchronous sessions
 - Order and organization

“It’s the people...!”



Residencies

- Sense of belonging (cohorts)
- Intense
- Opportunities for full day of coursework -- videos, tours, small group work, seminars, demonstrations, oral presentations, etc.
- Opportunities for program support and community building -- advising, mentoring, hands-on workshops, meals, social events, etc.



Group Work

- Clear and comprehensive instructions / expectations
- Guidance on how to function within the group
- When, how and what aspects of work will be evaluated



Synchronous sessions

- Unique aspect of program
- “Less is more”
- Script everything, but be ready to “go with the flow”
- Whispering



Order & organization

- Scrupulously up-to-date WITH immediate notification when changes are made
- Readings are consistently available in one place
- Site maps for large syllabi
- Clear policies, due dates and requirements in ONE place
- Samples, rubrics, charts, details...
